On June 29, 2023 I was dispatched to a welfare check at [REDACTED] Goodlettsville Police had requested a welfare check of Dartanion Dayton as he had made suicidal statements to his former girlfriend while in our jurisdiction. There was mention Dayton had been drinking alcohol, smoking pot, and known to carry a firearm. Prior to my arrival on Pearce Rd., I checked Dayton through QMNI and found he had four outstanding warrants for his arrest.

Officer Ynzunza and I arrived on scene and observed Dayton asleep in a blue 2018 Nissan Sentra, which had been mentioned in the call text. The driver's door was open; Dayton's stockinged left foot was propped on the door; Dayton was reclined in the driver's seat, asleep. Both shoes were off his feet and stacked on the floorboard of the driver's side. A bottle of spirits was lying on the passenger seat; approximately a quarter remained in the bottle. Officer Ynzunza approached the passenger window while I spoke to Dayton, waking him from his sleep. In speaking with Dayton, he leaned forward, revealing a black pistol beneath his right buttock.

While I distracted Dayton's attention and grabbed his wrists, Officer Ynzunza grabbed the pistol and secured it in his pants pocket. I explained to Dayton why Metro Police were in his presence: a welfare request had been issued on his behalf and we were to check his mental health status. Dayton insisted he was fine and officers should leave him alone. Dayton was advised due to outstanding warrants for his arrest we would have to take him into custody. He was then asked to step from the vehicle. Dayton, confused by being awakened, adamantly denied having any warrants and would not step from his vehicle. Dayton made several calls on his cellphone, including to his mother, who stepped from inside the house. Dayton continued to remain seated in his car. While Dayton began putting his shoes on, an additional officer was requested to assist in the arrest. Dayton stepped once from the vehicle, but moments later sat back down. He then attempted to start his vehicle twice but, due to it being out of gas, he gave up. Afterwards, he pleaded with his mother to help.

Dayton continued to remain seated in the vehicle and then suddenly slid from the driver's seat, across to the passenger seat. Dayton opened the passenger door and exited the vehicle while Officer Ynzunza ran to the passenger side to try to stop him. Dayton ran towards the end of the driveway; however, he lost his balance as he was running, propelling himself forward and across the street where he fell to the asphalt as he reached the other side of the street. Officer Ynzunza jumped on his back in an attempt to pin Dayton to the ground. I advised Dayton to stop resisting or I would deploy my Taser®. Dayton pushed up and shrugged Officer Ynzunza off of him and tried to run back across Pearce Rd. While Officer Ynzunza grabbed ahold of Dayton's right arm, I again advised Dayton if he did not comply with our commands I would tase him. Dayton shrugged Officer Ynzunza and me off of him and continued to run. As Dayton ran across Pearce Rd. onto the front lawn of [REDACTED], I deployed my Taser® once, striking him in the left buttock and left upper arm. Dayton fell forward onto the grass. I assisted Officer Ynzunza with handcuffing Dayton. Once he was taken into custody Dayton became cooperative and there was no further incident. I subsequently requested a supervisor to the scene.

Investigative Summary:

On 06-29-23, I responded to a Use of Force Incident resulting from the deployment of a conducted energy weapon (CEW) on a suspect with four outstanding warrants. Officers Ryan Ynzunza and Michelle Steidl were originally dispatched to the location to check the welfare of Mr. Dayton; he was reportedly suicidal. When they arrived on scene they found him asleep in his vehicle, which was parked in the driveway with the driver's door wide open. A bottle of liquor, nearly empty, was in plain view on the front passenger seat. Officer Steidl awakened Mr. Dayton and related that he had warrants. Officer Ynzunza observed a pistol protruding from under Mr. Dayton's right thigh and alerted Officer Steidl. She then grabbed Mr. Dayton's hands while Officer Ynzunza quickly removed the firearm and unloaded it. During the course of their interaction Mr. Dayton exhibited signs of being impaired.

Mr. Dayton denied having warrants and would not exit the vehicle as requested and later directed by both officers. Mr. Dayton never actually indicated he was refusing to exit his vehicle; he just kept procrastinating, attempting to delay the inevitable. However, for reasons unknown, he attempted twice to start the vehicle, but fortunately the engine would not turn over. Mr. Dayton's non-compliance went on for approximately eight minutes. Finally, he climbed over into the passenger side, exited, and ran into the street. Officer Ynzunza gave chase. Within 15 yards Mr. Dayton lost his footing and fell forward onto the pavement landing on his right hand. Officer Ynzunza attempted to pin down Mr. Dayton from behind by wrapping his arms around Mr. Dayton's torso. In the process Officer Ynzunza struck his left knee on the pavement and his body-worn camera detached from his uniform shirt. The BWC struck the pavement and damaged the camera.

Mr. Dayton overpowered Officer Ynzunza, stood up with him still on his back, and began to walk away. Due to Mr. Dayton's active resistance, after a few steps, Officer Ynzunza executed a leg sweep takedown, using his left leg against Mr. Dayton's left leg. When Mr. Dayton fell forward, he again landed on his right hand. Moments later Mr. Dayton broke free and started to run toward a neighboring grass field. Officer Steidl was in position to effectively deploy her CEW. Mr. Dayton fell facedown onto the grass. Officer Ynzunza quickly gained control of Mr. Dayton's right arm and successfully handcuffed Mr. Dayton with the assistance of Officer Steidl.

Upon arrival I spoke with the suspect, Dartanion Dayton, as he sat in the rear of Officer Steidl's marked patrol vehicle parked in front of the location. He was quite calm throughout our conversation and admitted running from the officers, who he claimed tackled him. During my preliminary investigation I learned the Taser® probes had already been removed by Officer Steidl. Mr. Dayton noted he was in good health and declined all medical attention.

As I continued my assessment of the Use of Force Incident, I observed the knuckles of Mr. Dayton's right hand were scraped, but the abrasions were not bleeding. It was initially thought the injury occurred when Mr. Dayton fell during the CEW deployment. However, upon a subsequent review of body-worn camera and in-car camera video I determined the injury to Mr. Dayton's hand occurred when it landed on the pavement as a result of falling either during the brief foot pursuit or subsequent leg sweep takedown executed by Officer Ynzunza.

Note: When Officer Ynzunza's BWC fell off, Mr. Dayton's mother (Linda Dayton / Witness#2) picked up the BWC and held it for safekeeping for over two minutes before returning it to Officer Ynzunza. Due to damage to the casing sustained in the fall, the BWC was taken to the Information Technology Section. The video was preserved and resulted in two partial recordings of the incident.

Interviews

I interviewed Officer Ynzunza at the scene. He later provided a written statement detailing his actions and observations. His written statement is consistent with his interview. I reviewed Officer Ynzunza's body-worn camera videos and in-car camera video, along with video associated with Officer Steidl. All the data is consistent with Officer Ynzunza's statement. (Officer Ynzunza's use of force began at the 13-minute mark in the initial recording and occurred between 00:45 and 01:45 during the second recording.)

I also interviewed Officer Steidl at the scene. She later provided a written statement detailing her actions and observations. Her written statement is consistent with her interview. I reviewed Officer Steidl's body-worn camera video and in-car camera videos. All the data is consistent with Officer Steidl's statement. (Officer Steidl's use of force occurred between 13:03 and 15:08.)

Conclusion of Facts

As stated above, I reviewed all available video footage from Officer Ynzunza and Officer Steidl relating to this incident. It appears their respective accounts are consistent with the recorded footage. Verbal requests, directions, and commands were given approximately four minutes into Officer Ynzunza's initial partial BWC video and immediately in the second partial BWC video. Additionally, verbal requests, directions, and commands were

given by Officer Steidl approximately four minutes into her BWC video. The suspect displayed verbal uncooperativeness by disregarding the officers' verbal directions and remaining in his vehicle for the better part of eight minutes. Despite the officers' patience and verbal attempts to gain cooperation and compliance to bring closure to the situation without escalating to a higher level of physical force, the suspect actively resisted their efforts by fleeing on foot.

When the suspect fell to the ground, he further demonstrated active resistance by standing up and continuing to flee on foot, while Officer Ynzunza's arms were wrapped around him and Officer Steidl was displaying her Taser® directly in front of him. Once the suspect broke free from Officer Ynzunza's hold and continued to flee, Officer Steidl escalated her level of force by deploying her Taser®. After the effective Taser® deployment the suspect became cooperative and apologetic, allowing the officers to deescalate their level of force to verbal direction only. (A Form 213B was completed for each officer.)

Based on my review, I find that both officers' actions were within policy and no further investigation is warranted.

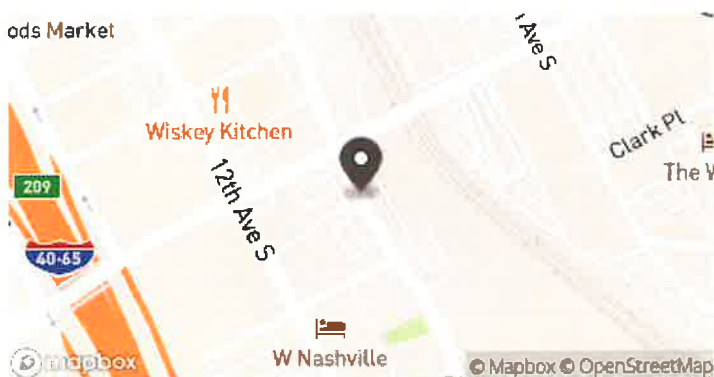

Response to Resistance – Supervisor Review

Description of Events:

On July 5th, 2025, at approximately 0500 hrs., Officer Ryan Ynzunza, Officer Natan Hicken, and Officer Eion Hurley were dispatched to a fight in progress at [REDACTED]. I was viewing a police pole camera near that location prior to the officer's arrival. When Officer Ynzunza and Officer Hicken arrived on scene they were informed by the complainant, that the subject walking away from the scene was involved. The officers gave the subject, Mr. Robert Duncan, commands to stop, but he began running away. Mr. Duncan ran east on Pine St

and continued sprinting until he reached 12th Avenue South where Officer Hurley intercepted in his patrol vehicle. When Mr. Duncan saw Officer Hurley, he stopped and put his hands up and slightly bent over as if he was going to lay on the ground. He did not lie on the ground. Officer Ynzunza pushed Mr. Duncan, and he fell over on the ground. Mr. Duncan complied, and the officers did not use force to place him in handcuffs. Mr. Duncan had a minor scrape on his knee after being taken into custody. The officers on scene announced on the radio that a supervisor needed to respond to the scene. I responded to the scene to interview Mr. Duncan. I also took photographs of his injury.

Suspect Interview:

I interviewed Mr. Duncan on the scene. Mr. Duncan admitted that he was very intoxicated and involved with a fight with a subject in the lobby of the hotel room. Mr. Duncan said he knew he shouldn't have run and heard the officers give him commands to stop. He did not have any problems with the actions taken by any of the officers on scene. Mr. Duncan said the scrape on his knee came from falling after officers took him into custody when he ran.

Officer Ynzunza Interview:

I spoke with Officer Ynzunza about the incident. Officer Ynzunza said he gave the subject commands to stop while they were in foot pursuit of him. He saw Officer Hurley get ahead of Mr. Duncan in his patrol vehicle before Mr. Duncan stopped. He observed that Mr. Duncan put his hands up and only halfway bent over to get on the ground. Officer Ynzunza was under the impression that Mr. Duncan was passively in compliance in order gain a better advantage to run or assault an officer, so he pushed him to the ground since he did not lay on the ground on his own.

Officer Hicken Interview:

I spoke with Officer Hicken, and his interview was consistent with his written statement. Officer Hicken said he gave the suspect commands to stop as the officers pursued him on foot, and the suspect did not obey those commands. He observed the suspect bend over halfway as if he was getting on the ground. He then saw Officer Ynzunza push the suspect to the ground where they took him into custody without further resistance.

Officer Hurley Interview:

I interviewed Officer Hurley. Officer Hurley said he heard the officers on scene announce that they were in foot pursuit just as he was arriving on scene. Officer Hurley saw the officers in active foot pursuit and got ahead of them while in his vehicle. He saw the suspect running and got in front of him also. Officer Hurley saw the suspect stop and put his hands up before seeing Officer Hicken and Officer Ynzunza taking him into custody.

Conclusion of Fact:

Officer Ynzunza utilized his official presence, verbal commands, soft-empty hand control, and a takedown maneuver (pushing), to take a person into custody that resisted a stop, frisk, halt which gave probable cause to arrest. Officer Ynzunza used a reasonable amount of force that was necessary to overcome the subject's resistance and to take him into custody.

Utilizing his official presence and verbal direction, Officer Ynzunza ordered the subject to comply; however, the subject refused to obey commands. The subject fled on foot and the officer escalated to utilizing a takedown maneuver to take the subject into custody. Officer Ynzunza used two hands to push the subject to the ground while he was slowing down from running at a full sprint. Officer Ynzunza had the intent to push the subject down to the ground but some of the momentum from Officer Ynzunza's forward movement carried over into the push. Although the subject put his hands up and slightly bent over, he did not lay on the ground. Officer Ynzunza viewed this action as partial compliance and used appropriate force to ensure compliance from the subject. After being taken to the ground, the subject was compliant, and use of force at this point was limited to soft empty-hand control. Officer Ynzunza handcuffed the subject and stood him to his feet, thus de-escalating his use of force against the subject. Officer Ynzunza escalated and de-escalated his force appropriately throughout the incident.

Officer Hicken assisted Officer Ynzunza during the foot pursuit in this incident. After the subject was on the ground, Officer Hicken grabbed the subject's left arm and placed it behind his back to be handcuffed by Officer Ynzunza. At this time, the subject was no longer resistant, and force was not used or needed by Officer Hicken when placing the subject's hand behind his back. Officer Hicken escalated and de-escalated use of force appropriately throughout the incident.

Officer Hurley assisted Officers Ynzunza and Hicken on the scene by transporting the subject in his patrol vehicle as they walked back to the scene.

Officer Hurley did not assist in handcuffing the subject.

After reviewing the above statements provided by all officers involved, as well as all BWC/ICC video associated with this incident, I find that all Officers' actions and use of force was consistent with and followed the current policy outlined in the Department Manual 11.10, Use of Force. The force used was reasonable and necessary and, therefore, justified.

I reviewed all the BWC/ICC footage captured and completed the required form 213B for the officer. During this review, I did not observe any behavior or actions regarding the use of force that needed to be addressed or corrected.

Coaching Points:

After observing all BWC and ICC video related to this incident, I spoke with Officer Ynzunza about continually giving commands throughout the duration of a RTR incident. I instructed officer Ynzunza to continually give commands while in a foot pursuit before, during, and while taking someone into custody in order to remove any confusion. In this incident, the subject's level of intoxication appears to be one of the primary factors to contribute to his non-compliance in this incident, including partial compliance. Officer Ynzunza was receptive to the coaching session.
